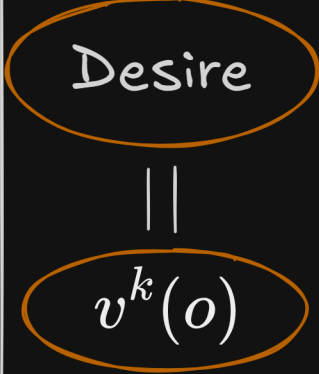
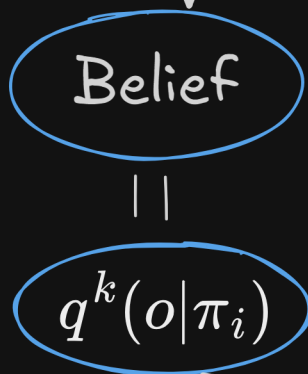


Unity through Clarity

In politics and in social life, disagreements can happen during choice moments that result in conflict. By questioning what can clarification resolve and unify?



By Predictive Processing, a recent but currently best unifying theory of the brain, to state one's reason to act, one must specify their belief, as that which generates the expected outcomes of all considered actions, and the desire as the preferred outcomes.



By doubt invariance

When doubting does not change one's beliefs, one's beliefs are free from wishful thinking. This is self-honesty and it is the best we can do to respect truth.

By role invariance

When the desire does not change by changing the expected role one will take in the story. This is the authorial desire who manifests only for sheer beauty. This is the mark of the moral.

The Existential Moral:
The ∇ must survive. It is not group versus group, but the ∇ against its downfall.

The Political Moral:
The ∇ as a new politics. A politics with clarity and without friendly fire by using the moral map.

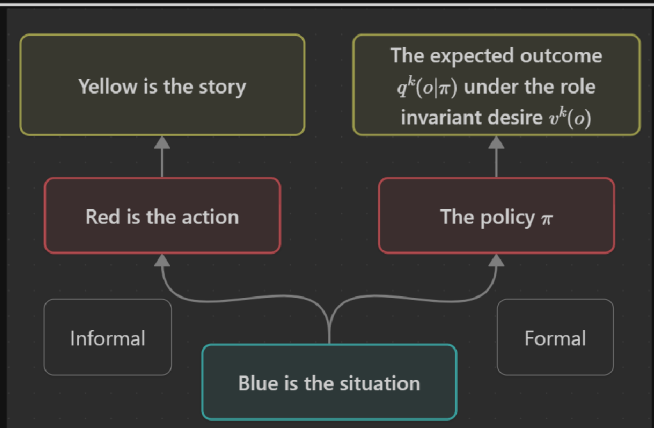


The ∇ always answers: Morals provide direction, but fear not letting go, for wherever you strand, you can always grow a moral anew.

Informally, a moral is the most beautiful story you expect you can tell through your actions, given your understanding of the situation.

Beauty refers to the role-invariant desire, where you care not what role you take. See book for formal version.



Note, always test the beliefs of any moral to make sure it is doubt invariant and thus free.
